A party aggrieved by this decision may petition the Board for rehearing within twenty (20) days after service of this decision pursuant to Wis. Stats. sec. 227.12. The petition in this instance would be captioned with Robert R. Robinson, R.N. as the respondent.

A party aggrieved by this decision who is a resident of this state may also petition for judicial review by filing the petition in the office of the clerk of the circuit court for the county where the party aggrieved resides within thirty (30) days after service of this decision. A party aggrieved by this decision who is not a resident of this state must file the petition for judicial review in the office of the clerk of circuit court for Dane County. A party aggrieved must also serve the board and other parties with a copy of the petition for judicial review within thirty (30) days after service of this decision pursuant to Wis. Stats. sec. 227.16. The party to be named as respondent in the petition is the State of Wisconsin Board of Nursing.

The parties in this matter agree to the terms and conditions of the attached stipulation as the final disposition of this matter, subject to the approval of the Board. The Board has reviewed this Stipulation and considers it acceptable.

Accordingly, the Board in this matter adopts the attached stipulation and makes the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Robert R. Robinson is licensed by the Wisconsin Board of Nursing as a registered nurse (license #60507; issued August 30, 1974). His current address is 3847 South Iowa Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53207.
- 2. Mr. Robinson's license as a registered nurse was granted, based in part upon Mr. Robinson's application for license, dated July 8, 1974.
- 3. Question #12 on the application reads: "Have you ever been arrested for or convicted of a criminal offense, excluding minor traffic violations? . . . If yes, describe, giving dates." In response to that question, Robinson answered "No". A copy of the application form is attached to this order.
- 4. In fact, on February 24, 1965 Respondent was convicted, upon his plea of guilty, of one count of First Degree Grand Larceny in the Chemung County Court in the city of Elmira, New York. As a result of that conviction Mr. Robinson was sentenced to not less than $2\frac{1}{2}$ years and not more than 5 years at the New York State Department of Corrections at Attica, New York; the execution of that sentence was suspended, and Mr. Robinson was placed on probation.
- 5. On November 1, 1983 Tom Redman, an investigator for the Wisconsin Department of Regulation and Licensing Division of Enforcement, inquired in a telephone conversation with Mr. Robinson whether he had ever been convicted of a felony in New York State. Mr. Robinson stated to investigator Redman that he had never been convicted of a felony in New York State.
- 6. On June 19, 1984 the deposition of Mr. Robinson was taken at 2100 Marine Plaza, Milwaukee, Wisconsin by Division of Enforcement attorney Jack Zwieg acting on behalf of the Nursing Home Administrators Examining Board. A copy of that deposition (29 pages in length) is attached to this Order. The deposition contains Mr. Robinson's explanation as to why he completed the application form in the manner in which he did.
- 7. Mr. Robinson's conviction was never expunsed, nor was Mr. Robinson ever pardoned by the State of New York. Mr. Robinson's conviction has been and remains a final conviction on the criminal charge described above.
- 8. Attorney Rinde represented Mr. Robinson in the New York criminal matter. Mr. Rinde indicates that he has no independent recollection of the case and that his records of the case were lost in a flood. Mr. Rinde further indicated that there was and is no way of expunging Mr. Robinson's criminal record in New York except by application to the Governor of New York for a pardon.
 - 9. Respondent is not currently practicing as a nurse in Wisconsin.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

By falsely representing on his application for licensure that he had never been arrested for or convicted of a criminal offense other than minor traffic violations, Mr. Robinson is subject to disciplinary action against his license pursuant to Wis. Stats. sec. 441.07(1)(a).

Therefore, it is hereby <a>ORDERED:

The license of Robert R. Robinson to practice as a registered nurse in the state of Wisconsin is suspended for a period of 60 days, commencing on Odober 7, , 1985.

STIPULATION

ROBERT R. ROBINSON, R.N., RESPONDENT.

It is hereby stipulated between Robert R. Robinson, R.N., personally and by his attorney Robert J. Berdan; and Steven M. Gloe, attorney for the Department of Regulation and Licensing, Division of Enforcement, as follows:

- 1. This stipulation is entered into as a result of the pending investigation of Mr. Robinson's licensure by the Division of Enforcement (case file #83 NURSE 20). Mr. Robinson consents to the resolution of this investigation by stipulation and without the issuance of a formal complaint.
- 2. Mr. Robinson understands that by signing this stipulation he voluntarily and knowingly waives his rights, including: the right to a hearing on the allegations against him, at which time the state has the burden of proving those allegations by clear, satisfactory and convincing evidence; the right to confront and cross-examine the witnesses against him; the right to call witnesses on his behalf and to compel their attendance by subpoena; the right to testify himself; the right to file objections to a proposed decision and to present briefs or oral arguments to the officials who are to enter the final decision; the right to petition for re-hearing; and all other applicable rights afforded to Mr. Robinson under the United States Constitution, the Wisconsin Constitution, the Wisconsin Statutes and the Wisconsin Administrative Code.
- 3. Mr. Robinson agrees to the adoption of the attached Final Decision and Order by the Board of Nursing.
- 4. If the terms of the stipulation are not acceptable to the Board, the parties shall not be bound by the contents of the stipulation, and the matter shall be returned to the Division of Enforcement for further proceedings.
- 5. If the board accepts the terms of the stipulation, the parties to the stipulation consent to the entry of the attached Final Decision and Order without further notice, pleading, appearance or consent of the parties.
- 6. Attached to this stipulation is the license card of Mr. Robinson. If the board does not accept this stipulation, the license of Mr. Robinson shall be returned to him with the notice of the board's decision not to accept the stipulation. If the board accepts the stipulation, Mr. Robinson's license shall be returned to him at the conclusion of his suspension.

- 7. The parties agree that Mr. Robinson's conviction record would not constitute a bar to licensure as a registered nurse in the State of Wisconsin.
- 8. The Division of Enforcement joins Mr. Robinson in recommending the Board of Nursing adopt the stipulation and issue the attached Final Decision and Order.

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ROBERT R. ROBINSON, called for examination

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by the Complainant, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

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EXAMINATION

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BY MR. ZWEIG:

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Q Mr. Robinson, my name is John Zweig. I am an attorney with the Wisconsin Department of Regulation and Licensing, Division of Enforcement. I am the prosecuting attorney in the matter of the disciplinary proceedings against Robert R. Robinson, N.H.A., and these disciplinary proceedings are before the Wisconsin Nursing Home Administrator Examining Board. deposition we are taking here today of you may be used in part in the proceedings currently scheduled against you. I am going to be asking you a series of questions, and when you answer the questions, you will have to answer orally. The court reporter can't take down the nod of your head or the wave of your hand. If you are answering using any document or paper, if it has been marked as an exhibit, please refer to the exhibit number so that, once again, the record is If you are unclear as to what I am asking you

at any point, please just say so, and I will attempt

to rephrase my question. Now, if your attorney,

Mr. Towers, objects to any question I ask, please 1 don't answer the question until he directs you to do 2 3 so, if he does. Now, do you understand all of that? 4 Yes, I do. 5 Okay. What is your name, please? Robert R. Robinson. 6 And, Mr. Robinson, you are currently licensed as a 7 8 nursing home administrator in the State of Wisconsin? 9 Yes, I am. 10 (Complainant's Exhibit No. 1 marked for } identification.) 11 I am going to show you what s been marked as Exhibit 12 No. 1. Would you please take a look at Exhibit No. 1 13 and tell me whether you can identify that document? 14 A Yes, I can. 15 Q What is it, sir? 16 It's a copy of the nursing home administrator's license 17 18 application. Q And is that in fact a copy of the application that you 19 completed? 20 A Yes. 21 And what is the date of that application? 22 A August 10, 1974. 23 Q And following your submitting that application to the 24 Board, you were licensed as a nursing home administrator? 25

Q How long did you stay at that position?

A Approximately two years. A year-and-a-

- A Approximately two years. A year-and-a-half to two years.
- Q And where were you then employed?
- A At that time I entered into a lease-purchase agreement with another party to take over the Southernaire Health Center.
- Q And where is that located?
- A St. Francis. 1915 East Tripoli Avenue, St. Francis, Wisconsin.
- Q And did you then become the administrator in that facility as well?
- A I became the administrator, yes.
- Q And have you been there ever since?
 - A Yes. Almost seven years.
 - Q So since the time you were licensed, your principal occupation has been administrator of nursing homes; is that correct?
 - A That's correct.
 - Q Now, if you will look at Exhibit No. 1, Mr. Robinson, and if you will look at question number two on the first page, will you read that question for us, please?
 - A Number two is yes or no, "I have been arrested for or convicted of an offense other than minor traffic violations, including armed forces court martial.

 If yes, state facts completely and concisely for

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and locality of court, and disposition of each matter." And how did you answer that question?

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"No." 5

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Was that a true answer?

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At the time I believed it was a true answer.

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Q All right. Now you have qualified your answer a bit here. What do you mean that at that time you believed it to be true?

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Well, it was my understanding the criminal offense that I had back in New York, that once I had made restitution and put in the probationary time that the court had imposed, that because of the nature of my employment prior to that crime, that the record would be wiped

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clean.

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What do you mean that the record would be wiped clean? That there would be no reference made; that it would be buried.

And you also said that this understanding had something to do with your prior employment; did you not?

A Yes, I did.

And what do you mean by that?

I was a police officer for eight years.

So I guess I don't see the connection between your being a police officer and your belief that the matter would

be wiped off the record. Can you clarify that a little?

A Yes. I agreed to resign my position on the police department rather than to go through litigation, and additionally, to make my compensation to the injured party and return of their properties, and I agreed to serve two years probation in order to have a clean record. It was my intention at that point in time to go back into police work.

- Q Did anyone advise you that you would have a clean record?
- A Yes.
- Q Who advised you of that?
- A My attorney at that time.
- Q And that was out in New York State?
 - A Yes.
- Q Do you recall his name?
- 6 | A No, I don't.
 - Q Was it your understanding that you would be pardoned after making the restitution?
 - A It would just be wiped off, wiped clean.

MR. TOWERS: If I can interject something here.

MR. ZWEIG: Sure.

MR. TOWERS: I checked on his criminal record. I found out about it just shortly--I think when Mr. Redman called or something is the first time

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I ever knew about it. But I called out there and found the name of the attorney. Mr. Robinson did not remember. And I talked to the attorney. All his records were lost in some either personal or communitywide flood as I recall. He had absolutely no recollection of this case, which you might imagine when somebody does criminal work, they're not going to remember something 20 years ago.

I asked him about the law in New York in terms of what I think is called expungence. I'm not a criminal lawyer, but I believe it's called expungence. But it's his understanding that you had to have a pardon from the govenor or something; that New York would not have a type of law that would permit expungence.

I am not well-versed in criminal law, but it very well may be that under these circumstances, something less than formal might be worked out--I don't know--in a small community.

It also might be that Bob misunderstood I will develop it with you later, but Bob does misunderstand things sometimes. And when I do some questioning, you will note his chronology is vague and things like that. So while I believe he is telling the truth, it appears that New York law does not

contemplate expungence laws like some states permit; after a certain number of years or under certain circumstances, you can have it expunged.

MR. ZWEIG: Okay.

- Q Well, Mr. Robinson, you never received any document from the State of New York or the court system telling you that the record had been wiped clean; did you?
- A No, I didn't.
- Q Is it your belief: at this point that your conviction still stands on the record?
- A Since Mr. Towers has done some investigative work, yes.

MR. TOWERS: And an interjection again.

We went through the F.B.I. files, and I understand you can't get it that way, and you can't get it through a new District Attorney who ran it through their computer. And he couldn't get it that way, either. But you can just call the court and get it, and so two out of three ways that we tried to get it, we couldn't get it.

MR. ZWEIG: Okay.

- Q Now, for my clarification, Mr. Robinson, you said that rather than litigate all this, you resigned your position from the police department and entered a plea of guilty; is that correct?
- A That's correct.

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- Q So the only litigation that was involved was the criminal case? There was no litigation regarding your being forced to terminate your position with the police department?
- A No. It was part of a deal that I would plead to a lesser charge of breaking and entering rather than some--- I can't remember what degree of burglary.
- Q Okay. Wasn't the conviction for grand larceny?
- A I don't remember.

MR. TOWERS: I checked it, and it's grand larceny. It looked like he pled to the greater offense and pled to it as guilty. That's my information, and I got a copy of it as well, so it's--

MR. ZWEIG:

- Q So when you completed the application, it was your belief that there was no conviction of record?
- A That's correct.
- Q And knowing that it was not of record, you felt no need to disclose it on the application?
- A Yes.
- Q Now, is that because you felt that it could not be checked, or was it because you felt that there was no conviction?
- A Well, I knew I pled, but from what I was informed at the time, I didn't believe that there was any record

of it.

Q Well, I'm not sure that that answers my question.

Perhaps I didn't ask it very clearly. Did you answer

no to that question on the application because you

thought that it could not be checked out?

A No.

Q Then you answered no because you thought that there was no standing conviction; is that correct?

A That's correct.

Q Now, at this point you do not have any letter or document from your attorney in New York advising you that the conviction would not be of record; do you?

A No, I don't.

Q Do you have any correspondence remaining from that attorney?

A No. I don't even recall who it was.

MR. TOWERS: I probably have the name of the attorney in a memo to the file, but like I say, he has absolutely no recollection of it-and did confirm--I didn't want to research it myself, and he was a criminal attorney--and he confirmed that there's--the only way you can get an expungence of the record is through the govenor as I recall.

MR. ZWEIG: Okay.

Q Well, Mr. Robinson, going back to the conviction of

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guilt that was based upon some act on your part, what was it that you had done that you were convicted of?

- Specifically, another man and I had been out drinking, and we had removed the tins from? the back door of a business establishment, a gun shop. Both of us were ex-marines and avid hunters, and I was easily led. The other guy was a little older than I am. In fact, he worked for the glass company that installed the doors for the company, and he knew that the place wasn't alarmed or anything, and he knew exactly how to take the door off the hinges, I guess. And we had taken some firearms, some rifles, and put the door back on the building and left the building. And subsequently we were questioned about it; and I admitted what I had done and returned the property and paid a fine.
- Okay. You said that the other fellow was older than You were 30 years old, approximately, at the time; weren't you?
- Approximately 27 or 28.
- At that time you were a police officer in the City of Elmira, New York?
- That's correct.
- Did this take place within the city?
- No.

I believe so. 1 It would have been in the same year. 2 MR. TOWERS: Off the record a second. 3 MR. ZWEIG: Sure. 4 (Discussion off the record.) 5 Now, Mr. Robinson, do you recall having a conversation on approximately November 1st, 1983 with Tom Redman, 6 an investigator for my department? 7 8 I recall a conversation with somebody identifying himself on the phone as someone from your department, yes. 9 10 And was that in approximately November of 1983? Yes. 11 Α 12 And that person inquired of you whether you had ever been convicted of a crime in New York State; did he not? 13 Yes, he did, but I was involved in some litigation at 14 the time, and I really didn't know who I was talking to on 15 16 the phone, and I called Mr. Towers immediately after that 17 phone call. So during that telephone call, you did, however, deny 18 having been convicted; did you not? 19 Yes, I did. Α 20 You also denied having ever been a police officer in 21 Elmira, New York? 22 Yes, I did. Α 23 And your reason for denying that was what? 24 That we were involved in some very nasty litigation at 25 Α

the time, and I really didn't know who I was speaking to on the phone, and I didn't feel that I had to give any more ammunition to the opposing side.

- Q And you did not contact our department to verify that that person was a representative of our department?
- A No, I didn't. I contacted my attorney, and he said to just leave it alone.

MR. TOWERS: That is true, I did advise him that; the reason being I had my hands full with his litigation, and I guess I could have confirmed it. I felt we would deal with it afterwards. We were dealing with, like he said, a very nasty litigation.

MR. ZWEIG:

- Q So on advice of counsel, you did not pursue verifying that that was someone from our department; is that correct?
- A That's correct.
- Q Now, in April of this year, you were involved in this litigation that's been referred to a few times here in the deposition, and you were asked some questions under oath there regarding whether you had pled guilty to a criminal charge in New York, or whether you had been convicted of a criminal charge in New York.

Mr. Robinsin, do you remember what the questions were that you were asked in that proceeding?

- Exactly what the questions were, I can't say, but I did state that I had been arrested and convicted in the State of New York at that trial.
- Now, you just said that you had been arrested and convicted. Now, let's take them one at a time. Did you at some point during that trial admit that you had been arrested in New York?
- A Yes.

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- Did you in that proceeding also admit that you had pled guilty to a charge in New York?
- Yes, I did.
- And then did you admit that you had been convicted of a criminal offense in New York?
- Yes, I did. I qualified it.
- And how did you qualify it?
 - That it did happen in the State of New York as stated, and I was not allowed to go on further. The judge let me answer it, but he said that it wasn't material to the case and it's not to be allowed.
- Q All right. Now, in April of this year then, you admitted to having been convicted of a crime in New York State. What happened between 1974, when you completed your application, and that day in April of 1984 that changed your view of your having been convicted?
- Mr. Towers indicated to me that it indeed in fact was

still on the record in New York.

- Q So your attorney had checked that out for you?
- A Yes.
- Q Well, Mr. Robinson, other than your statement that your attorney in New York State 20 years ago told you that if you served your probation, that the conviction would be wiped off the record, do you have--what else do you have to cause you to believe that?
- A Nothing in my possession.
- Q Did anyone else ever tell you anything similar to that?
- A I don't remember.

MR. TOWERS: I wanted to wait until he got his answers out, but I'm sure you want to know the answers as well as just knowing what he understands; and the fact that I checked, I think, is some indication. I wouldn't have done that to find out if there was a record if I wasn't told by Bob myself that he understood that was the case, and so my actions at least corroborated that belief.

MR. ZWEIG: Okay.

- Q Have you been arrested for anything since you were arrested back in 1964 in New York State?
- A No.
- Q Now, is it your belief, Mr. Robinson, that if we were to check any kind of applications you have completed

since that time, the time that you completed your probation in New York State, that you would have answered no to any question regarding having been convicted of a crime?

A I believe so. I cannot state that for a fact. I don't remember.

MR. TOWERS: Another interjection. If you will note-- maybe you haven't seen it, but a loan application that was-- There was a question, and he actually checked it or X'd it or whatever as yes, and then was advised by the banker that it was 20 years ago, and it was not material. And you can see it was whited out and changed to no. And so whether he's been consistent or not on that indicates to me is that he's not been totally consistent all the time.

MR. ZWEIG: That was a Small Business Administration loan?

MR. TOWERS: That's right. And so there may be inconsistencies; I don't know.

MR. ZWEIG:

- Q Let me ask you about that, Mr. Robinson. Do you recall the document that your attorney is referring to?
- A Yes, I do.
- Q Do you recall approximately when that was completed?
- A Four years ago.

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Q You were?

A As an administrator?

Yes, I was.

Q Do you recall the circumstances surrounding it being completed? That is, why the answer had been changed on the form?

- A Yes. I went to the banker after getting these volumes and volumes of paper from the S.B.A., and I sat down with the banker, and we went through essentially what we've gone through. And I was filling out the papers, and I marked it "yes", and he said, this doesn't have a damn thing to do with what you're doing or what you're involved with, and it's 20 years ago.
- Q Why did you mark it "yes"?
- A I don't know. I was sitting there in front of him going through it and trying to answer the questions, and I spoke to him about it and--
- Q So you were actually completing the form in his presence, and you were discussing with him the answers you were giving?
- A Yes.
- During the other litigation you were involved in in

 April of this year, were you asked in that litigation

 any questions about your application as a nursing home

 administrator?

nurse took care of him, and I ran into just fantastic, wonderful people; the health care people taking care of him. And it wasn't too long after my dad died, and I was injured. My left leg was crushed in an accident. I ended up in the hospital for six months myself. And, again, I had fantastic people taking care of me. And when I got out of the hospital, I had no job. I was a comp case. I was a guy that was serving probation, I couldn't get a job. I was a comp case, so I couldn't even go to work for construction anymore.

Workmen's Compensation?

THE WITNESS: That's right.

So I left the state, and I went to Texas. I worked down there on a construction project, and 90 percent of the people working with me or I was working for I couldn't even understand because I didn't speak Spanish. I was going with a gal that worked at a hospital there, and again I found just fantastic people. They were the ones that for two weeks fed me while I was trying to get enough money to eat, and then I decided that I would go into health care, and I went back to New York State. I went to work for my uncle as an apprentice barber, and I made application to nursing schools throughout New York State until I found one that I could qualify

for. I got my Barber's license so that I could support myself while I went to college and became licensed and went to work as a nurse in emergency rooms, because that's where I felt my calling was, to work with people who were suffering trauma because of the traumas that I have gone through and in intensive care units, and then I went on to work as a private nurse, because I felt that people weren't just being taken care of on floors the way they should be. I worked privately to rehabilitate people to get them back to their families, and I ended up being approached by a nursing home chain in New York to go to work as their Director of Nursing.

MR. TOWERS: This, obviously, kind of gets into chronology. I don't think we need to go any further. I developed his entire work history. I don't know if it gets all that relevant after here.

- The only other thing I wanted to ask you-- we didn't even talk about this, but I happen to know it-- but it's a leading question, and that is, you have hired people with convictions yourself?
- A Yes, I have.
- Q Okay.
- A I have hired them even though I knew they had records, and I put them in positions of trust and worked with

them because I felt that each one of us falls, and each one of us has to be able to find their own way back out. I tried, and I thought I had succeeded.

I fought for the rights of people and for the betterment of people all the time that I have been in nursing and as an administrator, and I took on a large corporation and the mayor of a city and a state senator in New York State because I wanted to fight for people and their rights to live to the fullest and for the betterment of people.

MR. TOWERS: Do you have any questions?

He can develop those. He did with me. I couldn't shut him up, though.

MR. ZWEIG: I have a few questions about the present.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. ZWEIG:

- Q You are the only licensed administrator at your facility; is that correct?
